March 2007, marked the 200th anniversary of a British Act of Parliament abolishing the slave trade. In the city of Richmond, Virginia at the site of the former slave market, where an estimated 300,000 kidnapped Africans and their descendants were torn from their families and 'sold down the river', 5,000 people celebrated the unveiling of a Reconciliation Statue. inscription on the base of the sculpture. composed school bv "Acknowledge the students reads: past, embrace the present, shape a future of reconciliation and justice." During this season of Pentecost we reflect on the outpouring of the Holy Spirit and celebrate healings of body, mind and spirit. In some places victims of hunger, humiliation and violence find justice, reconciliation and peace. In May, we met at Leith Valley Church where the Rev. Helen Harray gave us a wonderful insight into life in Uganda. Helen and her family and some students who are part of Student Soul at Otago University were there last year. The main purpose of their visit was to build a house for AIDS orphans. This is n amazing concept in a land where adults have become outnumbered by children – mostly orphans.

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In a land that has given up hope, the project shows that there is a way forward, but the people need help to realize their dreams. A lovely village is being built complete with House Mothers, schools, medical services and a church. We look forward to a visit to Dunedin in October when we will have the chance of hearing the Watoto Children's Choir from Uganda.

His Majesty Malietoa Tanumafili 11 died on 11 May 2007. Malietoa was the world's third longest reigning monarch.
