CONFERENCE

1-3 May 2009

God calls:
"Touch the Earth Lightly"

Our Conference Teacher/Facilitator, Chaplain and Music-maker have met and can now share that they will ground the theme by exploring the idea of 'Sabbath' – What it means for us to celebrate Earth as a sacred space, filled with God's vibrant presence, and to hear God's call to be partners with Christ in the healing of creation. So, *please join us* and keep the registrations flowing in.

REMITS:

(Please note this issue of Gleanings is a double issue. This is intentional as it gives everyone an idea of what is involved in supporting, or otherwise, Remit No 4).

Combined Taranaki APW/ MWF

That APW/MWF concentrate on ONE Special Project Theme per year, with the emphasis alternating annually between Overseas and N.Z. Projects.

Rationale

 The time-limit for focus on our Projects is limited to approximately 8 months with Christmas breaks in between (i.e. the September launch until May when Project monies are expected to be paid) making it difficult to do justice to two themes.

- The duplicity of focus causes confusion as to which interest is being covered.
- A feeling of 'competition' between the two nominated themes.

2. National Co-ordinating Group

That the Women's Study Grant be known as the APW Study Grant, Diane Croft Memorial.

Rationale:

Diane was passionate that women should have opportunity for study, and while National Treasurer, she recognized that there was money which could assist. Through the APW National Co-ordinating Group, she organised the setting up of the Fund.

3. National Co-ordinating Group Hospital Chaplaincy.

That APW write to the Prime Minister and Minister of Health requesting that Government funding for Hospital Chaplaincy be urgently reassessed.

Rationale:

- Hospital Chaplains are on 24 hour call ministering to the needs of all patients and their families, as well as hospital staff.
- With specialist treatment centralized, many people are away from their homes and family support for a considerable time
- Defence and Prison Chaplains are 100% funded by the Government, and yet the Hospital Chaplains, catering for more people, receive considerably less Government funding.

4. NCG & Gleanings Committee

That the Gleanings be enlarged

three times a year to include two A4 sides for the purpose of NCG business and NCG members contact details.

Rationale:

- This will provide the opportunity for NCG news and reports to be included with the Gleanings at regular intervals. In addition the larger, coloured Gleanings will continue to be published once a year.
- Members have expressed some frustration at not knowing the contact details of the NCG. Agreeing to this remit will mean contacts will be published more frequently.

5. NCG & Gleanings Committee

That the position of the Gleanings Editor and Committee rotate around the regions and serve not more than four years at any one term.

Rationale:

- Defining the length of tenure allows the Editor and Committee to know the expectations of the organization.
- The rotation around the regions allows other members to serve and contribute their talents.

of study. I have focused particularly on relationship counselling and have learned so much working alongside experienced couples and family counsellors in my placement in a non-church agency. I hope to continue working in the community and gain more experience in this field where there is such need and such opportunity to make a difference. My Christian faith has enabled me to bring the Lord Jesus into many situations, sometimes overtly, but mostly through prayer cover during and between sessions with hurting people. It has been an awesome privilege to identify with Jesus' heart for the poor, the lonely and the lost in this mission field and to work in partnership with Him in restoring relationships which are key to life. I hope to continue to offer such counselling to people who come seeking help through our church also, and to see what doors God opens for such a ministry. I am very thankful that the APW have stood with me financially and prayerfully through this time "

Book Review ...

'Three cups of Tea'

Greg Mortenson & David Oliver Pelin, Viking, Penguin, USA, 2006

Separated from his climbing companions, Greg Mortenson strayed from the known track as he descended from an unsuccessful attempt to climb K2. Lost on his descent he stumbled emaciated into a little known mountainous village of Korphe in Northern Pakistan. He was befriended and nursed back to strength.

In response to his question, addressed to the elder of the village, of repayment for their kindness, Greg was asked to build a school for the children of Korphe. Greg's promise that he would build a school, changed his

life. New Zealanders are rightly proud of the great humanitarian endeavours of Sir Edmund Hillary in Nepal This book, *Three Cups of Tea*, engages and informs the reader as one school at a time is built –fifty-three schools in all – in the Northern Pakistan and Afghanistan mountain villages. With every school was the insistence that girls as well as boys were to be educated This insistence was of particular importance following the repressive regime of the Taliban.

Three Cups of Tea is an arresting and intriguing title. It carries deep cultural understanding of developing trust. The extent of trust is a repeating joy in this book. External factors of tribal jealousies, religious bigotry the cultural and violent turmoil of the Taliban and the international political alliances that proved unreliable threatened to thwart

the endeavours of Mortenson, but trust surmounted and dispelled obstacles.

This is an inspiring book which also opens to the reader an appreciation of living in conditions so unfamiliar to us. This book is a read you will remember.

The guest speaker was Mr. Darren Fraser, the Salvation Army Youth Worker in Winton. He has established his own business, Micah Clothing out selling T-shirts and ieans using cotton purchased through Fair Trade outlets. Darren's passion to see an end to the injustice to disadvantaged producers was felt by everyone. He challenged those present to become Fair Trade Congregations and for us to lobby our local supermarkets and cafes to stock and sell Fair Trade coffee, tea and cocoa. We have an opportunity to make a difference. Check your supermarket shelves and look out for cafes who serve

Fair Trade coffee –you will be surprised who is supporting this initiative.

Such days together are not complete without hearing about some good books. Here are just three. The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Society by Mary Ann Shaffer; Twenty Chickens for a Saddle by Robin Scott and The Last Lecture by Randy Pausch.

Out of the Egg by Tina Matthews (claimed a 2008 Book Award in N.Z.) and The Short and Incredibly Happy Life of *Riley* by Colin Thompson and Amy Lissiat.(comes from the Children's Book Council of Australia and was the Picture Book of the year in 2006.) We shared these stories as part of the programme and they offered us food for thought, in the midst of preparing to celebrate God's Gift to us, amid the maddening crowds and the merry-go-round of consumerism

The Rev Dr Nan Burgess

On the occasion of the fiftieth anniversary of her ordination to the Deaconess Order of the PCANZ ON 29 January, 1959, members of the APW congratulate Nan and acknowledge her ordination to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament fifteen years later.

Nan is widely respected and valued by women and men throughout the church for her rich contribution as a Parish Deaconess at Knox Church, Christchurch; Principal of St Oran's College, Lower Hutt, teaching at the Theological Hall where she was interim Principal on three occasions; and her in-

volvement with the Deaconess Order; various Assembly Committees and with the APW especially at National level.


Nan has also made a rich contribution through her writing. Her doctoral thesis on Dimensions of Spirituality in New Zealand Short Stories, *Looking into the Depths*, was published in 1996. Nan has also written the history of the last fifteen years of the Deaconess Order in PCANZ *Except a Grain of Wheat;* and edited the three volumes of faith stories of NZ Women

entitled A Braided River of Faith.

Thanks be to God for Nan's creative and imaginative contributions over the years and we wish her a continuing happy and fulfilling retirement.
