As I faced my Maker at the last judgment, I knelt before the Lord along with all the other souls.

Each square was labeled with a part of my life that had been difficult; the challenges and temptations I was faced within every day life. I saw hardships that I endured, which were the largest holes of all.

I glanced around me. Nobody else had such squares. Other than a tiny hole here and there, the other tapestries were filled with rich color and the bright hues of worldly fortune. I gazed upon my own life and was disheartened..

My angel was sewing the ragged pieces of cloth together, threadbare and empty, like binding air.

I often struggled with the temptation to quit, only to somehow muster the strength to pick up and begin again. I spent many nights on my knees in prayer, asking for help and guidance in my life. had often been held up to ridicule. which endured painfully, Ι each time offering it up to the Father in hopes that I would not melt within my skin beneath the judgmental gaze of those who unfairly judged me.

And now, I had to face the truth.

My life was what it was, and I had to accept it for what it was.

I rose and slowly lifted the combined squares of my life to the light. An awe-filled gasp filled the air. I gazed around at the others who stared at me with wide eyes.

Then, I looked upon the tapestry before me. Light flooded the many holes, creating an image; the face of Christ. Then our Lord stood before me, with warmth and love in His eyes. He said, 'Every time you gave over your life to Me, it became My life, My hardships, and My struggles.

Each point of light in your life is when you stepped aside and let Me shine through, until there was more of Me than there was of you.'

May all our quilts be threadbare and worn, allowing Christ to shine through!

God determines who walks into your life - it's up to you to decide who you let walk away; who you let stay, and who you refuse to let go.'

CEDAW 2010

New Zealand ratified the United Nations Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW) in January 1985. Every four years the New Zealand Government reports to the CEDAW Monitoring Committee and at the same time, NGOs are also encouraged to write the Alternate Report. This reporting process provides a way for New Zealand women to tell the government and the international community if and how they are discriminated against. The 2010 Report will be presented in 2011.

The National Council of Women of New Zealand (NCWNZ) is facilitat-

ing the nationwide consultation process to produce the Alternate NGO CEDAW Report 2010. This is the opportunity for all women to voice their opinions, tell their stories and debate issues of mutual interest. There are several ways to engage in the project -

- To keep informed join the CE-DAW e-group by emailing kjsmith@ncwnz.org.nz.
- Attend a Regional Consultation Meeting to debate the issues. Your local NCW group will have details of local meetings.
- Join the Generations Public Forum to participate in quick polls

and post opinions. This group is divided into Generation S (Senior) and Generation Y and enables NCWNZ to assess the generational differences that exist and how that impacts on social opinion. Access this forum is through the NCWNZ website and information will also be posted in the NCW Circular.

This is the opportunity for all women to voice their opinions, tell their stories and debate issues of mutual interest in all facets of life.
