The Rev Dr. Nancy Joan Burgess 3.11.1930—18.2.2010

Nan, as she was usually known, was actively involved in APW from the time she moved to Waikanae following her retirement in 1996, until the day of her death. She was a loyal and hardworking member of the local APW group, most recently serving as its secretary, and she was a regular attender at meetings of Wellington Presbyterial, often assisting in organising its programmes. From 2000 to 2003 she was Programme, Prayer and Study Convener on the National Executive based in Manawatu, and continued for a further year as a member of the Interim National Executive based in Bay of Plenty. At the same time she convened the Task Group, appointed by the National Conference held in Feilding in 2003, to look at the restructuring of APW at national level. Most recently Nan has been editor of 'Gleanings', the APW monthly newsletter replacing 'Harvest Field'.

During her time on National Executive, Nan was instrumental in gathering together the stories of women of faith, written originally as part of the centenary of women's suffrage in 1993, editing them and painstakingly tracking down a photo of each of the women. In 2002 'A Braided River of Faith' containing the stories of 100 women was published, volumes II and III have followed and Nan was gathering stories for a

planned Volume IV when she died. The parade of banners at the 2002 General Assembly to celebrate 100 years of women's ministry within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand was also Nan's inspiration, and she wrote the accompanying commentary for the parade.

Nan was ordained as a deaconess in 1958, later becoming an ordained minister of the Word and Sacraments, but it was the deaconess motto "By love, serve" which Nan lived by for the rest of her life. She will be sadly missed, locally and nationally, in the church and in the community, and we give thanks to God for her life and service, and for what she has meant to each one of us.

Commission on the Status of Women

The following report was received from Mary prior to her departure for New York. A follow-up will be published in the next issue of Gleanings.

The Commission on the Status of Women session will be held in New York from 27 February until 13 March 2010 with the main focus being on reviewing progress since the Beijing Conference in 1995. As the UN Committee Convenor, I will represent Presbyterian Women New Zealand for the first week of the session. On 27 February I will take part in the Ecumenical Women Orientation Day where we are prepared for the process that takes place at the Commission, learn about advocacy and how we can assist with promoting the statement from Ecumenical Women to government delegations who will take part in determining the final outcome document and hear from women from around the world about developments in their countries since the Beijing Conference in 1995. On 28 February I will attend the NGO Forum where the regions around the world will report on the Regional Fo-

rums that have been held in the months prior to the NY Session. During the first week of the session I will participate in the NGO Parallel Event programme, meet with the NZ Government delegation to exchange information gathered and work with members of Ecumenical Women (EW) to bring the EW viewpoint and statement to as many international Government representatives as possible

Thankyou to everyone who has responded to the questionnaire I sent out prior to Christmas. I appreciate that the timing was a difficult one for groups to manage and all responses are much appreciated. I look forward to reporting back to you all on my return from New York, where Presbyterian Women NZ is an active participant in the work of gender equality and the empowerment of women and children.


