

What a Birthday Gift!

The total received from contributions to the Mission Birthday Gift amounted to \$27,739.15. This together with \$8,054.36 raised from Stamps amounted to \$35,793.51 which was allocated as follows:

\$10,000 Global Mission Office; \$2,200 Turakina College; \$2,000 each to Prison Ministry, Thailand; Vanuatu for Water Tanks, Women's Programme, Solomons, PCANZ Youth Ministry; \$1,500 each to St. Thomas' School, Jagadhri; Jagadhri Hospital; Emergency appeals Lebanon and Dafur, Sudan; \$1,000 each to NZ Friendship Farm, North Korea, Churches Education Commission, ECPAT, Christian Broadcasting Ass., Refugee & Migrant Service, Bible Society for children's Bibles in Entrea & Sth Pacific, Support of Ordinands in Dunedin; \$500 to Leprosy Mission and Pacific Leprosy Foundation. This leaves \$1,600 to allocate.

Without the commitment and dedication of the women of APW, these gifts would not be possible. A very warm thank you to everyone for this amazing result! Please pass on thanks to your parishes.

Gleanings in PDF

Requests have been made for Gleanings to be sent out in both PDF (or Adobe Acrobat) and a non converted version. There are reasons for converting to PDF, the key ones being ...

- documents sometimes 'move' in transmission through email and a document does not stay in its original format
- there could be a temptation by people to alter or replace an article for something they think would be more suitable for their district.

Therefore it has been decided that Gleanings will continue to be distributed in PDF version only. Some have said they do not open attachments; this means no matter what version it is sent in, you will not receive it.

News from the Regions

• Over the last year women from Wanaka and Hawea Cromwell have knitted forty-nine large blankets, thirty-three cot blankets, one hundred fourteen jerseys for children, seven adult jerseys, plus many scarves, hats, gloves, slippers, singlets and lovely toys. These items will be baled in Cromwell, then transported to Christchurch by Fulton & Hogan, free of charge. From there the Freight Company of NZ gets the bale to Auckland free of charge. The bale is then put in a container on a ship bound for the Netherlands. The freight costs are met by Aucklanders who do not knit. From a depot in Holland the knitted items are sent to an orphanage in Ukraine where they will be given out at Christmas time.

All were displayed in the church and a photo and article featured in Western Star newspaper. We have now been donated wool and are going to knit blankets for next year's Operation Cover-up.
