Five Unlikely Women Who Changed Eternity.

Five women in the lineage of Jesus Christ: *Tamar, Rahab, Ruth, Bathsheba, and Mary*. When you have a moment search through your Bible and rediscover the stories of these five amazing women:

Tamar – a victim of abuse and deceit, but a woman of determination, courage and hope (Genesis 38)

Rahab – the prostitute; a woman of faith who had a son named Boaz who married Ruth (Joshua 2 & 6)

Ruth – a woman of love, and the great-grandmother of King David. (Book of Ruth)

Bathsheba – a woman who received unlimited grace. She married King David, became the proud mother of Solomon, who succeeded his father David, on the throne (2 Samuel 11 & 12; 1 Chronicles 3; 1 Kings 1; Song of Songs 3)

Mary – a woman of obedience who became the mother of CHRIST (Luke 1 & 2); Matthew 2; John 19; Acts 1)

Francine Rivers in her novel, A Lineage of Grace explains in the foreword that "These were Eastern women who lived in ancient times and yet their stories apply to our lives and the difficult issues we face in our world today. They were on the edge. They had courage. They took risks. They did the unexpected. They lived daring lives and sometimes they made mistakes ... big mistakes. These women were not perfect, and yet God in His infinite mercy used them in His perfect plan to bring forth the Christ, the Saviour of the world."

St Andrew's & St Philip's, Birkenhead report a very active and loyal group of twenty members.. "The year has been very interesting and fruitful with speakers from CWS and Stroke victims and SPCA. We meet every two months. Fund-raising is a distinctive feature. The trading table, a mini fair, catering for a Scrabble Tournament, assisting our local College Music Group plus shipment costs for

articles sent to Operation Coverup have raised over \$1,500. We have been involved in Operation Cover-up for many years, knitting blankets, scarves and hats for orphanages in the Ukraine and Romania. This year we have been able to send 30 blankets, 30 scarves, 22 hats and other desperately needed items like sewing materials, soaps, stationery and games – a total of 200 items.

Special Project 2007-2008

The APW/MWF Special Project, "Opening Doors" will support overseas, the Christian World Service partner, *The House of Passage in Brazil*, and in New Zealand, the Churches' Education Commission's programme for chaplaincy in state schools.

The House of Passage opened in the city of Recife in the Northeast of Brazil in 1989 to attempt to meet the needs of young girls living on the streets or in the slums. The House successfully continues to provide basic needs, such as good meals, as well as training in life skills and vocational skills for these girls who live in extreme poverty, violence and abuse. Its programmes have now been extended to provide for boys as well.

The Churches' Education Commission, in its Christian Education programme in primary schools and its Chaplaincy programme in primary and secondary schools aims to enable students to make good life choices. The Special Project will provide funding for the ongoing training and support of these voluntary chaplains.

Vintage Volunteering....

Betty Scarlet has recently returned from volunteer work in Chiang Mai, Thailand where she assisted Kathryn McDaniel. Betty writes: I was there in June and July. At that time there were over twenty foreign men in the male prison, two women in their separate prison and five young folk in the Police Cells. The rules were different at each institution, but the men's prison work was most Tuesdays and Fridays were their time consuming. visiting days from 10.30 -11.30 a.m. We had to have a copy of our Passports for each visit with a list of those we wished to see. Quite early in my stay, Kathryn needed to be in Bangkok on a 'Prison Day". I would have to find my way there and do it almost alone (another volunteer would be there for some of the time. He rode a motor-bike). The notes I made began with. "First, find the place that the yellow buses depart from." I was totally confused at that stage as to how we reached that spot.

Traffic was overwhelming, especially the small motor cycles that wove in and out and gave way to no-one. Streets run at all sorts of angles with shop fronts that appear very similar. Maps of that part of the city lack detail and are no help. Kathryn invariably made a stop or two on the way to the bus to do the banking or some other errand, often ducking in one entrance and out another. She realized my problem and ordered a tuk-tuk to pick me up from her house and take me all the way to the prison. I loved riding in a tuk-tuk. Basically they are a motor-bike with seats for two passengers behind the driver. A roof offers protection but the sides are open and cool. With average day-time temperatures around 35 degrees, this was bliss...
