PLEASE NOTE:

The Charities Act 2005 requires all charitable entities to be registered in order to receive exemptions from paying tax on income; and gives such entities the right to issue receipts for tax rebates. To qualify, all registered organizations are required to close their financial accounts on 30 June 2008. This means that all groups within PCANZ must close their books on 30 June every year. This regulation includes all APW groups at national, regional and parish levels.

Book REVIEW

'Heart of Darfur '- Lisa French Blaker Hodder & Stoughton, London, 2007

This book is beautifully written by a New Zealand nurse who went to Dar-



fur with the humanitarian group called Doctors Without Frontiers (Medicines Sans Frontiers). It is a book you can't put down except perhaps to wipe tears and reflect on what the story tells of the human cost of the terrible war that rages in Darfur and has done for over twenty years. With her wealth of experience and great determination, Lisa still found much to test her sense of purpose and faith in human nature.

Lisa is a realist with a gift of sharing her experience of people and events simply and clearly so that we can enter into her feelings of purpose when she gives a dying baby a drink of water that rehydrates it so that it lives.

This book helps us understand how people with inadequate resources can still perform what are miracles from nothing. Alongside unspeakable expressions of 'man's inhumanity to man', we see the dignity and determination of the people, especially the patience of the women. Don't miss the little boy's song at the end. There lies hope.

Kenyan Crisis - Urgent appeal for help

As the violence and civil unrest in Kenya continues, increasing numbers of refugees are fleeing over the border to Uganda. CWS partner, the Church of Uganda, urgently needs US\$60,000 to meet the needs of the Kenyans, mainly women and children, seeking a safe haven.

Already more than 2,000 refugees are temporarily sheltered in schools and churches at the border. Many more are staying with family and friends. The Church of Uganda needs to provide them with food, plastic sheeting for temporary shelter, blankets, clothing, water supplies and sanitation services.

Christian World Service has already sent US10,000 from its

emergency funds and is appealing for member churches and the general public to support the appeal so more families can receive relief and ongoing support.

The crisis began on 27 December, when Kenya experienced ethnic clashes following disputed election results. Official figures put the death toll at over 600 people and yet violence is still continuing as the two major parties have failed to reach a negotiated settlement to the crisis. This has resulted in a major internal and external displacement of 250,000 people. The situation in Uganda has been overlooked and the needs are becoming critical.

Last year we were able to pay out \$4,900 in grants for general purposes, travel, and firewood, plus around \$2,000 for food vouchers, power bills, dental and medical and optical expenses thanks to your generosity. Individual groups donated a further \$1,145.50 in payments to their nominated student families.

Once again our thanks for your wonderful generosity year after year. You are doing a great work and enhancing the name of APW to the future ministers of our Church. We wish you all every blessing for 2008.
